Annual meeting to spotlight archaeologist's future involvement with KCHS

The annual meeting of the Kidron Community Historical Society will be held at the Kidron-Sonnenberg Heritage Center on Tuesday, February 24, at 7:30 p.m.

Following the business portion of the meeting, Dr. P. Nick Kardulias, Professor of Anthropology and Archaeology at the College of Wooster will be the guest speaker for the evening. Dr. Kardulias recently met with a committee organized under the leadership of KCHS board member Fritz Sprunger. In the spring, Dr. Kardulias, with the help of College of Wooster students and KCHS members, will survey the Pioneer Cemetery to establish the boundaries and locations of individual grave sites. The Pioneer Cemetery, the first cemetery of Sonnenberg Mennonite Church, is located on the Lloyd Lehman farm.

Dr. Kardulias will not be excavating at the cemetery or disturbing the resting places. He will use a device called a magnetometer to locate disturbances in the soil which would imply a particular area was excavated in the past. He will address our members at the meeting concerning his other work and how he intends to proceed in the Pioneer Cemetery. Dr. Kardulias has generously agreed that any documented material that he gathers will be owned by KCHS.

Dr. P. Nick Kardulias received his B.A. from Youngstown State University, his M.A. from the State University of New York and his Ph.D. from the Ohio State University. He has been a professor at the College of Wooster since 1996. He is currently field coordinator of the Ohio State University Excavations at Isthmia in Greece. He is widely published and has received numerous awards including the 2002 AIA (Archaeological Institute of America) national award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching.

Refreshments and a time to socialize and speak with KCHS officers will follow the meeting. Plan to join us for an evening of learning and fellowship.

While working at Sonnenberg Village last fall, we saw onlookers slow down on Hackett Road to watch as we completed the foundation for the Tschantz Log Cabin.

In November, people watched as we blocked Zuercher and Hackett Roads while moving the Lehman House. Many students and their teachers watched the Lehman House reach its new home. What an education for us all, of what it takes to preserve our history.

We enjoyed talking with those who stopped to see what we were doing or offer help. We welcome community help because Sonnenberg Village is all about our community. When the Sonnenberg Village project succeeds, it will be because we all believe in its value, for ourselves and future generations.

We are currently finishing a half-hour film about the 2008 building season that will appear on local cable. We will produce a film each year so that when Sonnenberg Village is finished we will have documented the entire process.

We are already making plans for the 2009 building season. The Saurer Blacksmith Shop will soon be dismantled. We will contact those who expressed an interest in helping with certain buildings to include them in the planning and building process. We welcome your interest in this project and welcome visits to see what's happening.

Mending Wall by Robert Frost

But they would have the rabbit out of hiding,

I let my neighbor know beyond the hill;
And on a day we meet to walk the line
And set the wall between us once again.
We keep the wall between us as we go.
To each the boulders that have fallen to each.
And some are loaves and some so nearly balls
We have to use a spell to make them balance:
'Stay where you are until our backs are turned!'
We wear our fingers rough with handling them.
Oh, just another kind of out-door game,
One on a side. It comes to little more:
There where it is we do not need the wall:

He is all pine and I am apple orchard.
My apple trees will never get across
And eat the cones under his pines, I tell him.
He only says, 'Good fences make good neighbors'.
Spring is the mischief in me, and I wonder
If I could put a notion in his head:
'Why do they make good neighbors? Isn't it
Where there are cows?
But here there are no cows.
Before I built a wall I'd ask to know
What I was walling in or walling out,
And to whom I was like to give offense.
Something there is that doesn't love a wall,
That wants it down.' I could say 'Elves' to him,
But it's not elves exactly, and I'd rather
He said it for himself. I see him there
Bringing a stone grasped firmly by the top
In each hand, like an old-stone savage armed.
He moves in darkness as it seems to me~
Not of woods only and the shade of trees.
He will not go behind his father's saying,
And he likes having thought of it so well
He says again, "Good fences make good neighbors."
