Fellowship with President Lincoln following annual meeting

The Kidron Community Historical Society will hold its annual meeting on February 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the upper level of the Heritage Center. Following the business portion of the meeting, Abraham Lincoln impersonator Gerald Payne will appear as if it were April 14, 1865, Good Friday.

On the Sunday before the events of April 14, Palm Sunday, General Robert E. Lee surrendered to General U.S. Grant at Appomattox Court House, bringing the long-awaited end of the Civil War.

In the reenactment of the evening of April 14, 1865, President and Mrs. Mary Lincoln will be attending the Ford Theatre in Washington, D.C., to watch their production of *Our American Cousin*. General Grant and his wife will accompany President and Mrs. Lincoln to the theater.

The President is looking forward to a restful evening before beginning to formulate plans to restore our nation to brotherhood and to work toward a future without the division of slavery. The president's time with us will be limited, but he will allow some time for questions.

This may be President Lincoln's only visit to Kidron, so make plans to attend.

Lehman notebook a valuable addition

After years of compiling information about everyone who is buried in the Sonnenberg Church cemetery, James O. Lehman, author of *Sonnenberg: A Haven and A Heritage*, has graciously donated a copy of his work to the Kidron Community Historical Society. The society is thrilled to accept and accession this wonderful record. It is titled *Sonnenberg Mennonite Church Cemetery Grave Markers and Family Connections, Kidron, Ohio*.

Lehman's latest book is a comprehensive report of the cemetery that was begun in 1861 with information from numerous and varied sources. Along with a long list of sources of individual family information, James gives special tribute to the following local sources: Deacon Jacob J. Moser, H. Clair Amstutz and SAGA (Swiss Anabaptist Genealogical Association), a phenomenal database compiled and maintained by Roger Geiser and his son Robert.

Anyone is welcome to stop in and browse through this priceless record.

The Smithsonian comes to Kidron

The Kidron-Sonnenberg Heritage Center was honored to host the Smithsonian Institution's traveling display *Between Fences* from October 20 through November 17 as part of its Museum on Main Street program. The 2009 KCHS annual display, *Good Fences Make Good Neighbors*, was designed by curator Allyson Leisy to complement the visiting exhibit.

Between Fences contained numerous interactive components such as peepholes, sliding fences, see-through items and interesting signs explaining the significance of different types of boundaries.

Approximately 50 people turned out for the October 19 Grand Opening. During the course of the exhibit, more than 500 people signed the guest book. Additionally five tours, totaling 137 people, were scheduled.

The display examined the history and significance of fences in the United States using hands-on exhibits designed to be interesting to visitors of all ages.

Between Fences was the second Smithsonian display Kidron has hosted. The first was *Barn Again* which was part of the 1997 annual display.

Sonnenberg Village develops, despite snow and cold

The Sonnenberg Village site may appear to be dormant as it lies under a blanket of snow, but looks can be deceiving. The village continues to grow as volunteers perform the countless tasks that take place behind the scenes.

The Dan Rufener family spent most of October and November disassembling a summer house on the Dan and Phebe (Steiner) Wesman farm and putting it under cover in Sonnenberg Village. When the weather improves in the spring, the family will begin putting it back up on its new site.

In the spring the College of Wooster will be contracted to do wood testing on some of our buildings to determine their age. Already the Tschantz (Schantz) family has had the Tschantz Log Cabin tested and family lore was verified as the College confirmed that it was built in 1824. This should make the cabin one of the oldest surviving wood structures in Wayne County.

Planning for future growth also is occurring. The first meeting of the Energy Technology Committee was held on January 16 at the Heritage Center. This committee is designing an electric and heating system for the village which should keep us from relying on commercial power suppliers as much as possible and also serve as a test case and a model for others who want to develop environmentally-friendly energy supplies.

Other committees will spend the winter planning for other buildings which may be moved to the village later this year. With so many key projects underway, 2010 should be an exciting year in the village.

German Hymn Sings

When I was young we always spoke Swiss at home. But when we went to church, all the preaching and singing was done in German. The reason I was given was that Swiss is not a written language so they used the Bible and songbooks written in German. Cleophas Amstutz, Jacob Moser and Jacob Neuenschwander all preached in German. Clifford Gerber's grandfather, David Hofstetter, John P. Lehman and his son David Lehman led the singing using German hymnals.

I can still hear Martha Sommer and her sister Hulda Amstutz resonate their rich alto voices to sing "Ich weisz einen Strom" on page 195 or "Hallelujah! Schoner Morgen" on page 1. At the time, it was taken for granted that everyone knew "Gott ist die Liebe" on page 29.

As time went on, the German language faded from use and the English language became predominant. But the older folks didn't let go of their fervor for four-part harmony. Men on the Kidron Community Council such as Dave Geiser and George Bixler started having community German hymn sings that filled the churches on Sunday afternoons. Paul Neuenschwander invited the German-speaking church in Cleveland to join. They often furnished special music. However, these hymn-sings discontinued after two or three years.

Now it is fortunate to hear the German New Year's Song still used to herald the New Year as new English hymnals have taken the place of German hymnals and rhythmic contemporary singing accompanied by a rhythmic band is rivaling a capella hymn singing. One can find literally hundreds of German books filed away in the Kidron Sonnenberg Heritage Center. Perhaps a revival of interest in the German language will take place in the future.

CommuniTree auction and meal give funds a boost

On October 17, more than 150 people participated in the fundraising meal and CommuniTree auction held at the Kidron Community Building. Twenty-three items made especially for the 2008 annual display were auctioned for a total price tag of \$2,810 which benefitted the KCHS endowment fund. The nearly \$1000 garnered by the fundraising meal went to the KCHS operating fund.
