Members banquet and auction will kick off KCHS 2010 season

The Kidron Community Historical Society's annual members banquet will be held on Tuesday, April 27, at 6:30 p.m. in the Kidron Mennonite Church Fellowship Building. Caution: Display under construction!

Spring is in the air, which means it's time for the Heritage Center to reopen. On April 1 at 11:00 a.m., the center will open its doors for 2010.

Construction of the new annual display, *Kidron Collects*, a unique assortment of collections, has begun. Nearly thirty Kidron-area residents have agreed to loan all or part of their collections to KCHS for the duration of the exhibit. Each collector is creating a unique display of their items and providing written explanations of their items for those not acquainted with their hobby.

Some collections that will be on display include canes, lemon juicers, pottery cookie jars, pens, thimbles, post cards, John Deere farm toys, Watkins products, intarsias, glass bottles, trivets, miniature sewing machines, accordion-shaped pins, remembrance cups, Peanuts memorabilia, business cards, baseball cards, watch fobs, Franklin Mint model firetrucks, antique glassware, unusual tools and collectible cars.

A word of warning to the early birds: because so many people are involved, creating the display may still be a work in progress. Director Prudy Steiner says, "It's our goal to have everything in place by April 27, when we have the grand opening of the display after the members banquet."

President Lincoln fellowships with members at KCHS annual meeting

The Kidron Heritage Center was the scene of an unprecedented presidential visit on February 23, 2010. Making the visit especially rare was the fact that the president in question, Abraham Lincoln, has been deceased for more than 140 years.

The KCHS 26th annual meeting featured Abraham Lincoln impersonator Gerald Payn who dramatized the events of April 14, 1865, as he and Mrs. Mary Lincoln were on their way to the Ford Theatre in Washington, D. C., to watch the production of *Our American Cousin*. The president was looking forward to a restful evening before beginning to formulate plans to restore the United States to brotherhood and to work toward a future without the division of slavery. As history shows, he never had the chance to develop and implement those plans due to fellow theater-attender and assassin John Wilkes Booth.

Sonnenberg Village fundraising campaign leader appointed



The Plum Tree Story

A few weeks ago Eileen (Mrs. Freeman) Lehman shared a story her mother-in-law, Edna Lehman, told her about Elmer Steiner's family living in rural Kidron about 1915. It demonstrates "living in peace with all people" so well that I asked permission to print it here.

The Steiner family had worked hard doing Saturday work and preparing for Sunday. Mother Steiner noticed during the afternoon that the plums on the tree in their yard were ripe and ready to be canned. But plums keep well on the tree, so she decided they could wait.

The family was returning home from the Sunday morning church service at Sonnenberg Church when Mother Steiner noticed that the plums on the tree had been picked and they were nowhere in sight.

The family ate their Sunday meal together and then Mrs. Steiner announced that she wanted to go visiting in the afternoon. This was not unusual because Sundays were good visiting times. But where she chose to go was unusual. She wanted to visit a specific family. As she suspected, they were canning plums when she arrived. She happily joined in to help can the plums.

Not one word was spoken about the theft of the plums after that day. But many years later the children of the culprit family attended the funeral of Mrs. Steiner. They spoke about the plums and how ashamed they had been about what happened. They also said the Steiners always treated them with love and respect and friendliness, despite the incident.

Elmer Steiner, who was around ten years old at the time of the incident, told Eileen that he had almost forgotten the incident because his mother never talked about it after that. She truly modeled grace and forgiveness to her family and community.
