Old-fashioned fun at Sonnenberg Homecoming

Fare from the Sonnenberg Mennonite Church's food trailer and Schloneger's Homemade Ice Cream was available.

The Akron Black Stockings Base Ball Club was on hand to play two local teams. The first game, against the Kidron Nine, went to the Black Stockings with a score of 9-5. The second game, the Black Stockings versus Kidron United, was won by Kidron United, 14-13. When asked why he plays for the Black Stockings rather than a regular team, one player said he prefers the old way of playing—like gentlemen.

According to tradition, the gear used is minimal—no gloves (players catch balls with their bare hands), a slightly larger and softer ball than the type used today, and a thin bat.

Sonnenberg Village fundraising under way

Under the leadership of Milton Troyer and the Sonnenberg Village Planning Committee, fundraising has begun. The focus for 2011 will be moving the Sonnenberg Church and the Saurer Blacksmith Shop to the Sonnenberg Village site.

The campaign is emerging from its planning stages and will be presented to the public in the months ahead. The system that has been designed is to allow donors to designate their contributions, whether monetary, in-kind or labor, toward the completion of specific projects within the village, or to contribute toward a general fund that can be drawn on for upkeep and other costs.

The third Sonnenberg Church, built in 1907, can be moved and restored for a projected cost of \$100,000. It will be open to the public, with possible uses being a prayer chapel and a gathering place for special events such as hymn sings.

Acquiring the Saurer Blacksmith Shop, constructed in 1906, is a unique opportunity for Sonnenberg Village because it still contains all of Floyd R. Saurer's blacksmithing tools. Curt Nussbaum, Eldon Kornhaus, Bob Gerber, Vilas Bixler and Wayne H. Miller have carefully cleaned and cataloged the tools and moved them to storage. The projected cost of dismantling, moving and restoring the blacksmith shop is \$50,000.

Sonnenberg Village update

Looking at Sonnenberg Village from the road may cause one to imagine that nothing much happened this summer to move closer to the dream's fulfillment. But a closer look would reveal a number of exciting changes. The following is a partial list of projects begun or completed in the village in 2010.



1. The front entrance (see photo to the left) was landscaped by volunteers using bright-colored, donated plants.
2. A 400-foot drain line was installed along the rain garden.
3. A second road was created.
4. A retaining berm was installed and has been approved by the EPA.
5. A portion of the village has been seeded with grass and is now being mowed in order to present an orderly appearance to visitors.



6. Two of the seven sections of the rain garden were installed and are operational with plants donated by OARDC. There is a chance that two more sections will be completed soon. (See photo at bottom left.)
7. The plan of completing the grounds in preparation for placement of buildings in the spring of 2011 was accomplished.
8. The Heritage Garden had a successful season and has been harvested. Plans are underway to add a butterfly garden, a period herb garden and a bluebird walk. If you have interest in helping with any of these projects please contact Prudy Steiner at 330-857-9111.

Swiss holiday traditions

Our Swiss ancestors were practical. They didn't follow secular trends that called for exchanging costly Christmas gifts; nor did they decorate their homes with trees or lavish decorations. If Santa's picture appeared on the front of a magazine, Mom would promptly tear it up and place it in the waste basket.

Instead the family observed the reason for the season—the coming of Jesus Christ to earth—with fellow believers in the church. The service included joyful Christmas carols, reading of the scripture or children performing a special program.

There were many family activities. The night before Christmas, the children were told to place their plates where they usually sat to eat at the table. In the morning they hurried to see what was on their plates. The girls clasped new handkerchiefs, the boys new pencils. All children found an orange and some ribbon candy.

When school was dismissed for vacation, the children would help bake and decorate Christmas cookies. The family would send out Christmas cards to distant relatives and friends. They were always ready to help others, especially those who would have to spend Christmas alone.

Children waited with joyful hope for the gathering of close family circles. Their mouths watered at the thought of the good food and grimaced at the thought that they were expected to sing or have a special poem for all the relatives. They loved playing games such as "Button, Button, Who's Got the Button?" with the cousins. Then Grandma would give each grandchild a small bird that she had made out of scrap material or show Grandpa's painted picture to be hung on the wall.

When the snow was deep, Dad or Grandpa would bring out the horse, clad with bells and hitched to an open sleigh. When all the family wanted to ride, a bobsled was used to slide across the open fields.

The next holiday was the coming of the New Year. On New Year's Eve the young people of the church would serenade each household with a musical home blessing. No one was to be missed so sometimes the children would be awakened at 3:00 in the morning to hear the serenaders.

May we, like our ancestors, create treasured memories that last a lifetime.
