
Cliff Lehman Honored for His Commitment to Sonnenberg Village Restoration

Cliff Lehman has been involved with Sonnenberg Village from the start due to his interest in the Lehman House. After it was moved, Cliff spent many hours helping to restore the building to its original condition. He has paid attention to the small details of restoration, particularly the replacement of many wooden parts, small and large, that could not have been fabricated by anyone else in the "Tuesday Group."

After the Lehman House was finished, Cliff stayed on to work on building after building. He knows so much about so much that the group continued to defer to him for the fine work of restoration on other buildings, with great success. We know that, at the same time as he was working in the Village, he devoted even more time to the Heritage Center, and to the Sonnenberg Mennonite Church and many other community projects.

As soon as the Tuesday Group learned that Cliff was approaching his 90th birthday, they decided to throw a recognition party for him. They knew that Cliff might not welcome their plans, so they turned to two men who knew him better: his son Mike Lehman, and Steve Gerber. Both suggested some community friends that had worked with or for him years ago. Then both Mike and Steve reached out to the people he knew best over the years and all agreed to a "surprise" party instead of the normal break before the crew started to work one September Tuesday. They were more surprised than Cliff that he had not heard about the plan, and the party was a surprise to him.

Knowing that Cliff had everything he needed in the way of woodworking tools, he was given something they knew he would never ask for, but would certainly surprise him. Steve Gerber made a plaque, out of wood, of course, to be placed in the workshop in the basement of the Welcome Center. It reads "Clifford Lehman Carpenter Shop 2022."

Sonnenberg Village Celebrates 15 Years

While the 15th anniversary of the founding of Sonnenberg Village may not seem like a significant milestone, it is remarkable when we consider the amount of work and number of buildings completed in the Village in those short fifteen years. From the gift of land by the Leonard and Nada Geiser Family and the Tschantz Cabin, we have finished landscaping the Village to be an attractive site. We have moved or rebuilt nine major buildings and some small support buildings and established gardens and an arboretum on the five acres of land, all with many volunteer hours and some paid assistance. The dream of so many people has become a reality.

The Saurer Blacksmith Shop is now completed and in full operation. The Gerber/Nussbaum Barn has received an occupancy permit; however, the barn is not ready to rent for events quite yet. In the spring we need to make a few additions in order to serve rentals. The other major project this year is the Moser Buggy Shop/Print Shop. At this time it is still under reconstruction to make it usable as a print shop.

Ray Norr has been working closely with our volunteers to place printing equipment in the right spot and to be able to print some material for special events. The Moser building has required some major reconstruction, all of which has been completed by volunteers.

The 2022 Homecoming was a huge success, especially with the help of the Wolf family. We were able to begin charging admission for the first time, and expect to cover all of the Sonnenberg Village utility expenses this year with the proceeds.

With permission of the Bixler Family, the use of the Bixler House has been donated to "Hope's House," an organization of 20 families in the area of Sugarcreek Township who provide homes for children removed from their homes in Stark and Wayne Counties. These committed foster parents have stocked the upstairs of the Bixler House with clothing, diapers, formula and other items that items will be available for the use of children who arrive in foster care at all hours of the day, sometimes late at night after stores have closed, without basic necessities. The children are often removed from homes without many of these items due to the volatility of the adults' situations. The temporary families receiving the children will have access to the donated items needed to provide for their care. Julie (Geiser) Kirby will be responsible for meeting the foster parents and giving them what assistance they require, regardless of the time, day or night. We are glad that we can help in this needed service.

The main floor of the Bixler House will be pleasantly furnished and continue to be used during Sonnenberg Village Homecoming and the Beet Festival for craft demonstrations.
