Gerber/Nussbaum Barn Has Deep Local History



The Gerber/Nussbaum Barn has been painted and served as the venue for a variety of events. In July the Wayne County Community Band held a concert in the barn, and the Schantz Organ Company's centenial celebration was held in conjunction with Sonnenberg Village Homecoming in August, followed by a barn concert by Honeytown, a local band directed by Tim Shue. The spacious three-season structure (spring, summer and fall) is not heated. Overhead fans and a restroom will be installed next spring. Special thanks to Art Neuenschwander who oversaw the restoration of the Gerber/ Nussbaum Barn, and for his work with David Kridler on the Nussbaum Summer House and the lamp posts lighting the driveway from the Tschantz Cabin to the barn. Additional lights from the Tschantz Cabin to the end of the Rain Garden are still projected to be installed this fall.

The Gerber/Nussbaum Barn is a typical bank barn constructed in a fashion so the lower level can be easily accessed, often under an overshoot or forebay. The upper level is accessed by a man-made bank, as it was originally built in 1848.

When Archibald and Rebecca Steel held ownership of the land on Kidron Road a mile south of town from 1847-1860, the barn would have been considered a well-built addition to their property.

The farm with the large bank barn, constructed of post and beams, was sold to David and Barbara (Welty) Baumgartner in 1860. Abraham C. and Anna (Baumgartner) Tschantz were the owners from 1860-1875, followed by John L. and Barbara L. Tschantz from 1875 to 1912. Nicholas S. and Maria (Tschantz) Amstutz held possession of the farm from 1912-1920 when Cleophus and Caroline (Lehman) Amstutz purchased it.

In 1926 Albert A. and Sarah A. Nussbaum bought the farm. They sold it to their son Herman and Marilyn (Gerber) Nussbaum in 1956. Herman and Marilyn sold the farm to Glenn and Phyllis (Nussbaum) Gerber in 1987.

Glenn and Phyllis continue to reside on the working farm. When the barn was no longer able to serve their modern farming practices, Glenn and Phyllis chose to donate the historic barn to the KCHS. It was dismantled, stored and reconstructed at the current location on the southeast section of Sonnenberg Village in 2022.

Ronald Hahn: 1947-2019

Our Kidron Weather Man

A quiet, unassuming man grew up on the north edge of Kidron, next to Kidron Mennonite Church. Ron Hahn appreciated the intricacies of printing presses and all things

weather related. Locals recognized the white louvered box in the field between his house and the church as Hahn's weather station. He regularly reported rainfall and other weatherrelated details to the Dalton Gazette-Kidron News and notable weather occurrences in Kidron to Dick Goddard of Fox 8 News in Cleveland.
